Spice-ophrenia: What We Have Learned in the IDOC

The use of synthetic cannabimimetics, known as Spice, K2, or Aroma is increasing in our communities and within our prison walls. While substance abuse is often intertwined with mental health symptoms, whether for self-medication, withdrawal, or long-term consequences, the use of K2 is unique in many ways. Due to being quasi-legal, cheap, easily available, and no routine laboratory tests to confirm its use, the prevalence has been reported as increasing in the USA, Europe, and in forensic settings. Symptoms of use include hallucinations, agitation, anxiety, and paranoia, with some of these psychotic symptoms never going away. We will be conducting a literature review as well as presenting a few case studies in our unique inpatient setting.

Dr. Deanna Dwenger is Executive Director of Behavioral Health. Dr. Deanna Dwenger is a graduate of The Chicago School of Professional Psychology with a doctorate in clinical psychology and concentration in forensics. Her passion for corrections began while working with pre-adjudicated juveniles and court-ordered domestic violence individuals in the Chicago-land area. Dr. Dwenger then went on to complete her pre-doctoral internship with the Federal Bureau of Prisons. In 2013, Dr. Dwenger began her service in IDOC as Lead Psychologist at New Castle Psychiatric and then became the Director of Behavioral Health for Wexford Health in 2017 before moving to the IDOC in January 2021.



Amy Eickmeier is the current Director of Mental Health for the Indiana Department of Correction (IDOC) and assumed this role in July of 2019. Director Eickmeier oversees the delivery of mental health care within the IDOC while working to develop policies, procedures, training, and implementing special projects to improve the care provided to the incarcerated population. Director Eickmeier has been employed by the IDOC since 2006 and previously served in case management and as a case management supervisor at Wabash Valley Correctional Facility. She worked in general population and restrictive housing areas as well as gaining experience working directly with incarcerated individuals with mental health and addiction treatment needs. When she became a supervisor, she worked collaboratively with treatment and operational staff to improve communication and decision-making to provide the best care possible for individuals with mental illness. Since promoting to a director position in 2016, she has supported executive staff in initiatives related to improving mental health care, restrictive housing management, staff wellness, suicide prevention, and offender movement.

Director Eickmeier earned a Bachelor's degree in Psychology and Criminology from Indiana State University. She is working on completing a Master's degree in Social Work from Indiana University-Purdue University Indianapolis. She is a 2013 graduate of the Commissioner's Experienced and Emerging Leadership Program and served for five years on the Critical Incident Stress Management Emergency Response Operation's team.



We Are Not All the Same: Client Focused Recovery and Integrated Care in Corrections

The Indiana Department of Correction (IDOC) has shifted the focus and goal of substance use treatment to providing the level of care and resources needed for the individual person instead of a one-size fits all approach. Inclusion of peer support through various methods supports patient recovery by providing opportunities to relate to others who have experienced treatment and recovery. An expansion of Medication Assisted Treatment is providing additional resources for patients to maintain recovery. A specialized co-occurring disorders treatment program is now fully functional and providing evidence-based treatment for the first time in IDOC history to patients experiencing both substance use and mental health disorders, recently celebrating the graduation of the first two groups of patients. Using innovative approaches and working with multidisciplinary teams at each site, we embrace the idea that not all patients have the same needs and that there are many pathways to recovery.

Angela West, MPH, CADAC, is the current Director of Addiction Recovery Services for the Indiana Department of Correction and assumed this role in July 2021. Ms. West oversees the Recovery While Incarcerated (RWI) program as well as promotes a culture that is inclusive, culturally responsive, and accessible for the incarcerated population and IDOC staff. Ms. West has worked with the incarcerated population since 2013, and previously served as an Addiction Recovery Specialist managing a case load of clients and instructing groups at New Castle Correctional Facility. She was promoted to the role of Director of Addiction Recovery at NCCF in February 2020 and managed the Level 1 Facility, the General Population Facility, the Annex Facility, and the Mental Health Facility. During that time, she worked to minimize the stigma associated with individuals seeking treatment for substance use. Once Angela assumed the role of Director of Addiction Recovery Services for the State, she began to focus on expansion of services and treatment opportunities to the offender population. This was done through re-writing policy and working to change the culture of Addiction Recovery Services to be seen as a medical treatment.



Ms. West earned a Bachelor's degree in Clinical Laboratory Science from the University of Cincinnati and she went on to work at the Cincinnati VA Medical Center. Angela earned a Master's degree in Public Health from the American Military University and conducted her Master's Thesis research on the incarcerated Veteran population in the State of Indiana and their substance use needs. She also holds an active Certified Alcohol and Drug Addiction Consultant (CADAC) II credential through ICAADA and is in the process of obtaining her Medication Assisted Treatment Specialist (MATS) credential through ICAADA.

Ms. West enlisted in the Army in 2014 and later Commissioned as an Armor Officer in 2016. Angela is actively serving as a Commissioned Officer with the 76th Infantry Combat Brigade Team of the Indiana National Guard. She enjoys the travel and leadership experiences that accompany that role and is looking forward to completing the next level of Professional Military Education at The Command and General Staff College to advance her career.

5. **Include a 500 word essay expressing why you should receive the scholarship and your philosophy on criminal justice in Indiana.**




Hello ICJA Students,



Distinguished Service Award

Created in 1966, the Distinguished Service Award is the highest individual award bestowed by the ICJA. Nominees will be considered if he/she has been a member for more than five years and is in good standing at the time of nomination. The nominee shall have made an outstanding contribution to the field of the criminal justice and corrections systems. He/she shall also have participated in some capacity in the ICJA's endeavors while having a positive effect on the status and effectiveness of ICJA.

The Awards Committee Chairperson, acting as a non-voting chair, will direct a closed meeting of the Executive Board in making the election of the Distinguished Service Award.

Warren W. Martin Award

Judge Warren W. Martin presided in Clark County Superior Court Number One from 1967 until his death in 1973. He was widely known for his innovative and progressive programs designed to reach troubled youth. The award was created as a memorial to Judge Martin and is the highest award given by the ICJA to an Indiana Court having juvenile jurisdiction. The award is only presented when very specific criteria are met and the President's appointed committee recommends the court following an on-site visit and evaluation. If more than three courts are nominated, the Board of Directors shall select three finalists to be visited and considered for the award.

Guidelines for submitting nominations are:

- An Indiana court that has juvenile jurisdiction and serves a majority (over 50%) of juveniles in the county or facility/agency that serves juveniles.
- One of the staff (i.e., presiding judge or probation/corrections staff) must be an ICJA member in good standing. Probation officers must be state certified.
- The program nominated must have three letters of support from three different disciplines (i.e., social services, police, churches, and school personnel).
- The program/court/agency must have demonstrated one or more effective diversionary programs that enhance the well-being of the juveniles being served.
- Facility/agency/probation department records must reflect the quality of the department upon examination.
- Volunteerism and/or creative community resources that enhance the department's effectiveness will be considered.
- The attitude and appearance of officers and support staff will be considered.
- The degree to which programs enhance the family will be considered.
- Feedback from local agencies that network with the nominated court/agency/facility will be considered.

The Indiana Criminal Justice/Correctional Program of the Year

This award was created to recognize an outstanding adult correctional program, facility, agency or institution within Indiana. Consideration will be given to a recipient who has delivered high quality service to clients with effective results in rehabilitating offenders/clients/inmates, by improving their self-worth, community integration and/or economic status. Service of the recipient program are delivered in a manner that shows respect for human dignity while, simultaneously protecting public safety and improving the quality of life in Indiana.

The method of investigation, evaluation and selection shall be the same as that used in the Warren Martin Award.

Guidelines for submitting nominations are:

- The program must primarily be involved in the provision of services to individuals in the correctional system.
- The program can show evidence of increased productive integration of clients into the mainstream of community life and/or has demonstrated an effective program of crime prevention or control.
- The program has demonstrated its' ability to enhance self-worth of clients and/or improvement in their economic status.
- **A minimum of one letter of recommendation is required to be included with the nomination for this award.**

Probation Officer of the Year

The award recognizes a probation officer that works with adults or juveniles and has demonstrated a high degree of dedication and professionalism on the job, utilizing and developing community contacts and resources, making appropriate referrals and working with felons and/or misdemeanants and their families to reduce criminal, violent or anti-social activity and promote responsible behavior. Guidelines for submitting nominations are:

- Degree to which he/she has taken advantage of opportunities to better themselves and develop their professional skills through continuing education and/or involvement in professional organizations.
- Degree to which he/she has demonstrated involvement in community improvement projects, programs and organizations outside the scope of their job.
- Degree to which he/she has demonstrated a commitment to innovative approaches and programs including alternatives to traditional incarceration where possible.
- Degree to which he/she has demonstrated an ability to work with fellow professionals both within and outside their department.
- The nominee must be a state certified probation officer.
- **Nominees for this award shall be adult/juvenile line probation officers or chief probation officers who are responsible for supervising two line officers or less, while dealing directly with his/her own caseload 85% of the time. If administrative obligations require more than 15% of the CPO's time, he/she should be nominated under the Correctional Manager category.**

Counselor of the Year

This award is designed to acknowledge the outstanding achievements and dedication of a counselor (i.e., substance abuse, life skills, mental health, case manager, etc.) from a public or private correctional center, facility, institution, or program who works directly in contact with offenders/clients/inmates and perform their duties in a consistently professional manner. Guidelines for submitting nominations are:

- The degree to which the candidate is effective in supervising and working with offenders in obtaining desired results and overcoming negative influences as lack of motivation on the part of the offender.
- Degree to which the nominee has demonstrated the ability and judgment to counsel when appropriate and discipline when necessary.
- Degree to which the individual has shown alertness and the ability to act quickly and effectively during an emergency situation.
- Degree to which nominee projects a positive attitude and the ability to work effectively with peers and superiors.

Correctional Educator/Trainer of the Year

This award recognizes excellence in correctional education by those who labor to provide high quality instructions for adult/juvenile incarcerated offenders and/or correctional professionals or students (i.e., professors, trainers, etc.). Guidelines for submitting nominations are:

- Degree to which nominee has shown excellence in innovative teaching methods.
- Degree to which he/she has demonstrated involvement in community improvement projects, programs and organizations outside the classroom.
- Degree to which he/she has shown an ability to work with fellow professionals for the benefit of student and/or community.
- Degree to which he/she has shown a commitment to education as a solution to a better tomorrow.

Correctional Manager of the Year

This award recognizes a manager, supervisor, director or Chief Probation Officer for excellence in managing a juvenile or adult program, agency, department or unit. Guidelines for submitting nominations are:

- Degree of involvement with a variety of administrative duties involving discretion in interpretation, application and execution of policies and programs.
- Degree to which nominee is involved in the review of organizational structure, functions, and assists with implementing changes to promote efficiency.
- Degree to which nominee has exercised good judgment and creativity in the adaptation of administrative goals and procedures in handling new or unusual situations involving multiple and complex variables.
- Degree to which nominee projects a positive attitude and the ability to work with superiors and subordinates alike.

Correctional Office of the Year "Front Line" Award

This award recognizes an employee in a juvenile/adult public or private correctional center (jail, prison, detention center); facility, institutions or program (work release center officer) that works directly in contact with offenders for custody/supervision purposes and perform duties in a consistently professional manner. Guidelines for submitting nominations are:

- Degree to which he/she is effective in supervising and/or working with offenders, obtaining desired results and overcoming such factors as lack of motivation on the part of the offender.
- Degree to which he/she had demonstrated the ability and sound judgment to counsel when appropriate and discipline when necessary.
- Degree to which recipient has shown alertness and the ability to act quickly and effectively in an emergency.
- Degree to which nominee projects a positive attitude and the ability to work effectively with supervisors and peers.

Community Corrections Line Staff of the Year

This award honors the community corrections "line staff" professional (work release custody officers should be nominated under correctional officer of the year) who works in home detention, day reporting, or other community correction programming "line staff" promoting public safety and providing care and services to those awaiting adjudication or serving sentences. Guidelines for submitting nominations are:

- Degree to which he/she has demonstrated a commitment to the highest standard of professional conduct and service.
- Degree to which he/she demonstrates a commitment to the highest principles of community corrections.
- Degree to which he/she has shown sound judgment and the ability to work well under adverse or emergency situations.
- Degree to which he/she projects a positive attitude and the ability to work effectively with supervisors, peers and their assigned caseload.

Judge of the Year

The purpose of this award is to recognize an Indiana Judge who has demonstrated a high degree of dedication, professionalism and leadership in the administration and development of efficient and effective court services. Guidelines for submitting nominations are:

- Degree to which he/she has placed the development and operation of professional court services above political affiliation.
- Involvement of nominee in community improvement projects, programs and organizations outside the scope of his/her duties as a judge.
- Degree to which nominee has demonstrated a commitment to innovative approaches and programs including alternatives to traditional incarceration where possible and appropriate.
- Degree to which he/she has demonstrated an ability to work with fellow professionals both within and outside of his/her jurisdiction.
- Commitment of the nominee to operating court service programs under prevailing guidelines and standards of professional practice

A letter of endorsement from the local bar association should be included with at least one additional written nomination for this award. The nominated judge does NOT have to be an ICJA member.

Support Services Staff of the Year

The purpose of this award is to recognize the invaluable contribution of those who take on the responsibility of providing services that are necessary to the completion of the correctional mission. Secretaries, administrative assistants, maintenance staff, food service, payroll personnel, and others who do not provide direct client services, but work diligently to provide support and assistance to those who do will be considered for this award. Direct services staff realize that professional support staff is vital to public service and the delivery of services in the criminal justice field. Guidelines for submitting nominations are:

- Degree to which he/she has demonstrated professionalism and commitment to his/her work.
- Degree to which he/she has a positive attitude and demonstrates the ability to work effectively with supervisors, peers and subordinates.
- Other relevant information supporting the worthiness of the nominee for recognition.

Parole Officer of the Year

The purpose of this award is to recognize a juvenile/adult parole officer who has demonstrated dedication and professionalism on the job, utilizing and developing community contacts and resources, making appropriate referrals and working with felons and/or misdemeanants and their families to reduce criminal, violent, or anti-social activity and promote responsible behavior. The professional parole officer is ever mindful of his/her responsibilities to assist offenders, consider public safety and conduct thorough investigations of the Parole Board. Guidelines for submitting nominations are:

- Degree to which nominee has taken advantage of opportunities to better him/herself and develop professional skills through continuing education and/or involvement in professional organizations.
- Involvement of nominee in community improvement projects, programs and organizations outside the scope of their normal duties.
- Degree to which he/she has demonstrated a commitment of service and professional conduct.
- Degree to which he/she has demonstrated the ability to work with professionals both within and outside their department.

Correctional Officer of the Year "Front Line" Award

This award recognizes an employee in a juvenile/adult public or private correctional center (jail/prison/detention center), facility, institution, or program (work release officer) who works directly in contact with offenders for custody/supervision purposes and performs duties in a consistently professional manner. Considerations in judging the recipient of this award are:

- Degree to which he/she is effective in supervising and/or working with offenders, obtaining desired results and overcoming such factors as lack of motivation on the part of the offender.
- Degree to which he/she had demonstrated the ability and sound judgment to counsel when appropriate and discipline when necessary.
- Degree to which recipient has shown alertness and the ability to act quickly and effectively in an emergency.
- Degree to which nominee projects a positive attitude and the ability to work effectively with supervisors and peers.

Law Enforcement Officer of the Year "Front Line" Award

This award is designed to acknowledge the outstanding achievements and dedication of a Law Enforcement Officer from a public or private police department and performs their duties in a consistently professional manner.

Considerations in judging the recipient of this award are:

- Degree to which he/she is effective in their day to day duty as they serve the public and ensure the public safety.
- Degree to which he/she had demonstrated the ability and sound judgment to counsel when appropriate and discipline when necessary.
- Degree to which recipient has shown alertness and the ability to act quickly and effectively in an emergency.
- Degree to which nominee projects a positive attitude and the ability to work effectively with supervisors and peers.

Volunteer of the Year

This award is in recognition of those individuals who have given of themselves through their efforts to volunteer their time, energies and talents without consideration for compensation of their activity. This category is open to any person who has offered assistance to any public or private center, facility, institution, agency or program in the criminal justice field. Guidelines for submitting nominations are:

- Degree to which their service has benefited the criminal justice field.
- Degree to which an individual has displayed a commitment to the highest ideals of professionalism and service.
- Degree to which the person has projected a positive attitude and the ability to work effectively with the individuals who work in the field, or who are receiving services from some branch of the criminal justice system.

The volunteer does NOT have to be an ICJA member.

Juvenile Services Staff

This award is to recognize anyone that works in Probation, Parole, DOC, private facilities, or courts that service Juveniles. Must be an ICJA member

Rising Star Award


This award is to recognize anyone in the Criminal Justice Field that is a "mover and shaker" and a leader. Guidelines for submitting nominees are as follows:





SHOWERS – Chronic Issues and How to Avoid Them

Mold, mildew, peeling, flaking, tiles delaminating, grout joints impossible to keep clean, water penetrating through surfaces, water entering day rooms, water leaking from mezzanine to main floors below? Sound familiar? Is the health department flagging your facility's showers as health hazards?

All of these shower problems are often caused by poor design, inferior finishes and other non-structural issues. Tile Wall and Floor Issues: Did you know that the typical tile wall for a shower that is only 3 foot by 3 foot has 465 lineal feet of grout joints just on the walls alone? Grout joints are porous and that is a lot of area to maintain and protect from water penetration. If you count the floors on a typical 3 foot by 3 foot mosaic tile floor you add nearly 220 additional lineal feet of grout joints. If the grout fails water can enter and tiles can delaminate. This not only poses a water issue, but a safety issue as tiles can be filed down into shanks. Recent Article Investigating Denial Among Mandated Adolescents

The SASSI Institute is proud to announce our newest manuscript addressing adolescent substance abuse. The title of this article is *Mandated Treatment for Troubled Adolescents and Substance Use Disorder: Identifying and Breaking Through Defensiveness and Denial*. It provides an investigation of the defensiveness demonstrated by teens who are mandated to participate in treatment as compared to their non-mandated peers. Part of the data set we collected for The Substance Abuse Subtle Screening Inventory (SASSI) Institute's third iteration of the Adolescent SASSI-A3, the present study focused on data from 164 mandated teens that participated in the principal study. As in the principal study, these cases were drawn from substance use treatment, criminal justice programs, community corrections, and private clinical practices, among other venues, and all cases were provided by clinicians working within these service settings throughout all U.S. Census Regions. In addition, we review cases demonstrating high-levels of defensiveness and denial in these mandated teen clients, and ethical ways to break through that barrier towards effective treatment engagement. Finally, we present two brief de-identified treatment case studies, aptly demonstrating defensiveness and denial from a clinical standpoint. We at The SASSI Institute are very proud of this work, and I want to personally thank my co-authors for making this work possible. 





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“Fentapills,” Fentanyl, illicit opioids & the Black-Market Internet:

A Perfect Storm of Danger and Death

On November 17, 2021 the Centers for Disease Control, National Center for Health Statistics, Office of Communication, released findings indicating that there were an estimated **100,306 drug overdose deaths** in the United States during 12-month period ending in April 2021, an increase of 28.5% from the 78,056 deaths during the same period the year before. Overdose deaths from synthetic opioids (**primarily fentanyl**) and psychostimulants such as methamphetamine also increased in the 12-month period ending in April 2021. Cocaine deaths also increased, as did deaths from natural and semi-synthetic opioids (such as prescription pain medication).

Mortality statistics are compiled in accordance with World Health Organization (WHO) regulations specifying that WHO member nations classify and code causes of death with the current revision of the *International Statistical Classification of Diseases and Related Health Problems* (ICD). ICD provides the basic guidance used in virtually all countries to code and classify causes of death. It provides not only disease, injury, and poisoning categories but also the rules used to select the single underlying cause of death for tabulation from the several diagnoses that may be reported on a single death certificate, as well as definitions, tabulation lists, the format of the death certificate, and regulations on use of the classification (National Vital Statistics System. Instructions for classifying the underlying cause of death. In: NCHS instruction manual; Part 2a. Published annually).

The underlying headline is that **we, as a group must unify our efforts on all fronts to protect all of these individuals**, which unfortunately include friends, family and loved ones. Substance Use Disorder indeed does not discriminate! Let's up our awareness, prevention efforts and of course interdiction. The SASSI Institute provides articles discussing some of these important issues, especially how they are affecting one of our most vulnerable populations, teenagers. 

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
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
